




## Knowledge Organiser: How should we care for others and the world, and why does it matter?

<b>Key Learning</b>
Retell Bible stories and stories from another faith about caring for others and the world.
Identify ways that some people make a response to God by caring for others and the world.
Talk about some texts from different religions that promote the 'Golden Rule' and think about what would happen if people followed this idea more.
Use creative ways to express their own ideas about the creation story and what it says about what God is like.

<b>Key Vocabulary</b>	
<b>Unique</b>	Being the only one of its kind; unlike anything else.
<b>Neighbour</b>	Christian definition anyone with whom we live or whom we chance to meet (whatever their race, religion etc).
<b>Tzedekah</b>	Looking after those who are in need.
<b>Sukkot</b>	Jewish festival.
<b>Genesis</b>	The first book of the Bible which is also found in the Torah.
<b>Creation</b>	Beliefs about how the world was made.

<b>Dr Barnardo</b>	He set up a charity to give education and shelter to orphans. He lived in Victorian times.

<b>Jesus</b>	Jesus tells the disciples to let the children come to him. Stories told by Jesus.
<b>Golden Rule</b>	Jesus told his followers, "Do unto others as you would have them do

unto you." Other religious and non-religious viewpoints share this rule.

Tzedekah is the Jewish idea of charitable giving to those who need help. For Jewish people this is part of making the world a better place, fairer and more just.

### **Sukkot**

A festival when Jewish people remember those who are poor by giving meals and shelter and donating money.

### **Creation**

The story of how God created the world as set out in the Jewish Torah and Christian Bible.
